FACILITY DEVELOPMENT FUND

To encourage practices to invest in improving their building and facilities the trust has established a facility development fund. Any established general practice in the Pinnacle network undertaking facility development is eligible to apply for a grant, up to a maximum of \$50,000 (plus GST).

Coromandel Family Health Centre

In March 2018 Coromandel received a grant that allowed them to make improvements to refurbish the treatment room along with creating a clinical workstation and dedicated sluice room.

Dr A E Pinfold

Dr Pinfold, who practices as a solo GP at the Duke Street Medical Centre in Cambridge, received funding to make improvements to the existing premises by converting an existing treatment room into a theatre, sluice room and storage area.


